
Rosi Ware and the MARC group visited in full force on the Saturday of the sale.






## **October Meeting**

Rita, Jane Tiedeman, Danielle Huarda and Missy Krile are working on the lights by the green gazebo.


Donna Farrow also headed up the decorating committee. She and Hazel Hans are enjoying the beautiful tree.
