I look forward to being able to see many of you in the upcoming months, as restrictions lessen and we will be able to meet again in person.


DO come and visit the gardens whenever you can – it is such a gorgeous place, with restorative powers; you cannot help but come away with new hope in your heart!




took on the project of replacing

These are photos of two of six Shona statues which were carved by free Black artisans in the 20th century and given to this Garden in the 21st century by American born descendants of formerly enslaved African people to memorialize the suffering, longing and courage of kidnapped Africans buried in the African Cemetery on a tropical beach in Key West during the 19th century. "May we never forget."


A plaque will be installed inside the fort in what has now become our 'history room'. It also happens to be the closest part of the fort to the African Cemetery.

The second tour was made up of 9-11 year-olds. These students were incredibly knowledgeable about plants, the environment, entomology and ecology, and took copious notes of everything we spoke about on the tour—from the very rare semaphore cactus, the cycads and dioons in the "dinosaur garden" to the Silk Floss "Monkey don't climb" tree; one student noticed bees pollinating the aloe plants and caterpillars munching the milkweed in the butterfly garden.

If these kids exemplify the younger generation, I believe the world is in good hands!! A wonderful time was had by all!
