




GARDEN TOURS

Trail Walk on Cudjoe Key



General Meeting Lecture

One of our lecturers was historian Cory Malcolm who gave a history of the African Memorial adjacent to the West Martello. The cemetery at Higgs Beach contains the remains of nearly 300 men, woman and children who died in Key West in 1860. In the summer of that year, the U.S. Navy rescued 1,432 Africans from three American-owned ships engaged in the illegal slave trade.

The ships bound for Cuba were intercepted by the Navy, which brought the Africans to Key West where they were provided clothing, shelter and medical care.

Rosi wants to thank her Garden Club friends for all the love, kind wishes and support they have sent to her in hospital and now back at home...it has meant the world to her and helps get her up in the morning ready to do battle in the rehab arena each day!!

Big thanks for all the truly delicious food...Rosi is building up her strength after 4 weeks in hospital! It's going to be a long road until she can return to working in the gardens...but will be able to visit in her wheelchair very soon.

Below is Jeff's latest update:

"Is it just me, or is it getting harder to keep track of time nowadays? The days just seem to fly by. Rosi and I are in a nice routine with regard to the road to recovery. Monday, Wednesday and Friday usually start at 8am with dropping Rosi off at rehab for two hours of intense work. Then usually one of our wonderful Team Recovery members will pick her up and bring her home. I'm allowed to duck out of the pickup duties so I can continue to work out at my studio on my latest creation. It's actually good therapy for me to be honest. We are united again for lunch and the rest of the day thereafter.

Rehab is getting quite intense. The therapists have actually strapped Rosi to the exercise bike so that the arm and leg stay attached.

The days when Rosi doesn't go to rehab bring no rest for her. We start the day with about 90 minutes of exercises and stretches before one of her designated "walkers" arrives to walk with her around the neighborhood so I can go to the studio and work. A block used to take around 45 minutes to complete, but today's was achieved in just over 30 minutes, such has been her improvement recently. We now also have a PT Table at home for Rosi to do her exercises on -- though you could be excused for thinking that the table is actually for Leroy to use. He just loves being involved in things all the time. On more than one occasion he has

been trapped under one of Rosi's limbs, but he just doesn't seem to care and is happy to come back for more.

Despite all this rehab work, a full recovery will still take quite a bit of time, but at least we are able to see little improvements every day so we know that all the effort is worth it.
