The Key West Garden Club's story is intertwined with the West Martello Tower's history. This dedicated


group of horticulture enthusiasts took over the tower's grounds in the 1950s when the tower was abandoned, and they transformed it into a thriving botanical garden.

We, as members of the Garden Club, should take some pride in our goals of promoting education of local history, flora and fauna.








The Gazebo Project - Nell Smets

As the ornaments began showing their age and it was more difficult to attach swags to the aging bricks the ornaments were not displayed. Our late receptionist, Michael, took the ornaments and arranged them in a basket attempting to hide some of their damage and make them a part of our holiday décor. It was a lovely display. When the season approached Jane decided to arrange them on a wreath, attempting to camouflage some broken parts and hang the wreath near the yearly Christmas tree location.
