
Workings Around the Garden

Propagation Retrospective

Kitty Somerville put together a timeline for our Propagation area. Many years of sheer determination and getting grants has turned our nursery into something we can be proud of.



Propagation 2007. We got bathtubs from the Navy and propagated in a community "bath". The floor was dirt. The shelves were falling apart. Ron Zemlicka, our treasurer at the time, pitching in. We expanded the shade area.



In 2011, the plastic ground covering was a tripping problem. The wooden benches were all different heights and pressure treated.

In 2011 we got pea rock flooring

In 2011 we got pea rock flooring Marlyn, Deb Crowley and Darin are overseeing.

2017, partly from the grant we purchased proper tops to the benches.

Benches were now all the same height, to make it easy to weed.





The coated steel benches were bought later in 2017 with grant money. Sharon Lieberman will remember that they came in boxes of screws and steel parts that she and the men had to build.

Propagation 2021- the Tiki thatch roof was replaced by then. The shade area was added (you can see it in the back of the photo).

The Green Gazebo (taken from the Garden Club's website blog page)

It is finally time for our well-worn but much-loved Green Gazebo to be reborn as the Ficus Folly Courtyard Gazebo. In architecture, a folly is a 'building constructed primarily for decoration, but suggesting through its appearance some other purpose, or of such extravagant appearance that it transcends the range of usual garden buildings'. This new construction will be far from ordinary: nestled among two majestic ficus trees, our Ficus Folly Courtyard Gazebo will feel right at home. Designed by architect/member Nell Smets, it will shine in its period-appropriate design yet modern efficiency. Today, volunteers completed the final steps to make the area ready for construction to commence. We will say goodbye to the Green Gazebo as it is deconstructed. We will keep you posted!
